- Decreasing community confidence in HEI →
decreased global competitiveness of their graduates

Why do we need a ranking system



- Current global rankings are biased by their negligence to the institutional mission & their being partial to Anglophonic countries
- Some of the criteria used in current rankings lack validity & or reliability

2. Providing credible information about the competitive status of various Islamic Universities to allow stakeholders to make informed decisions
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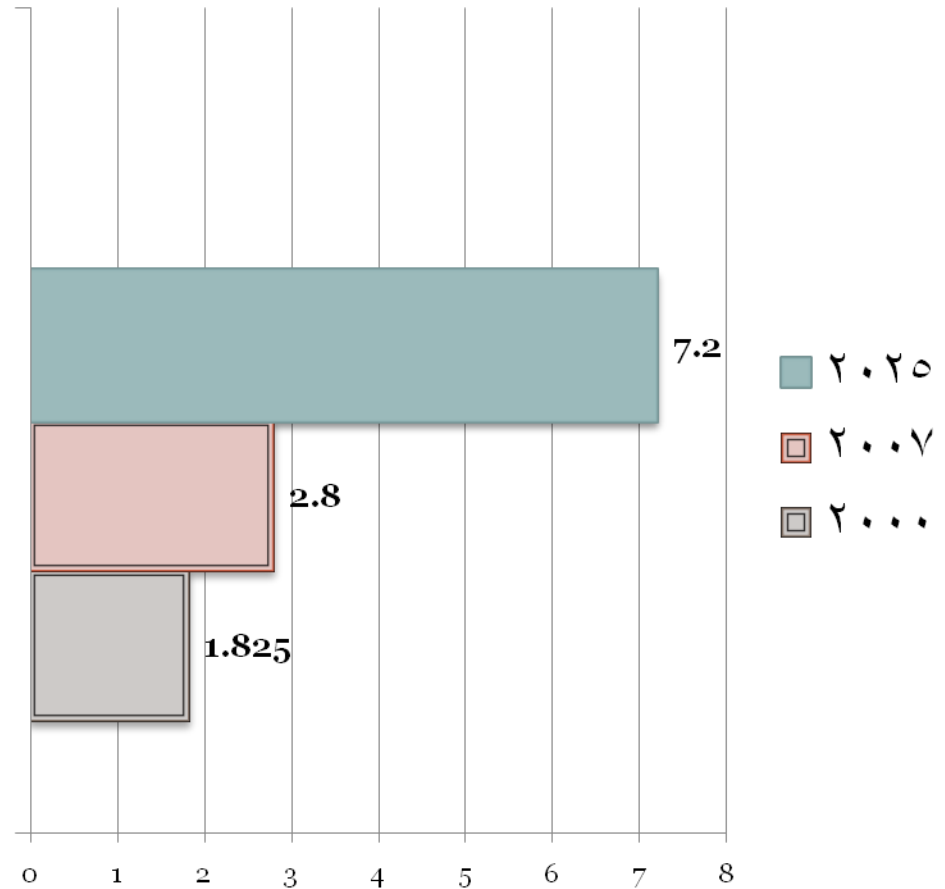

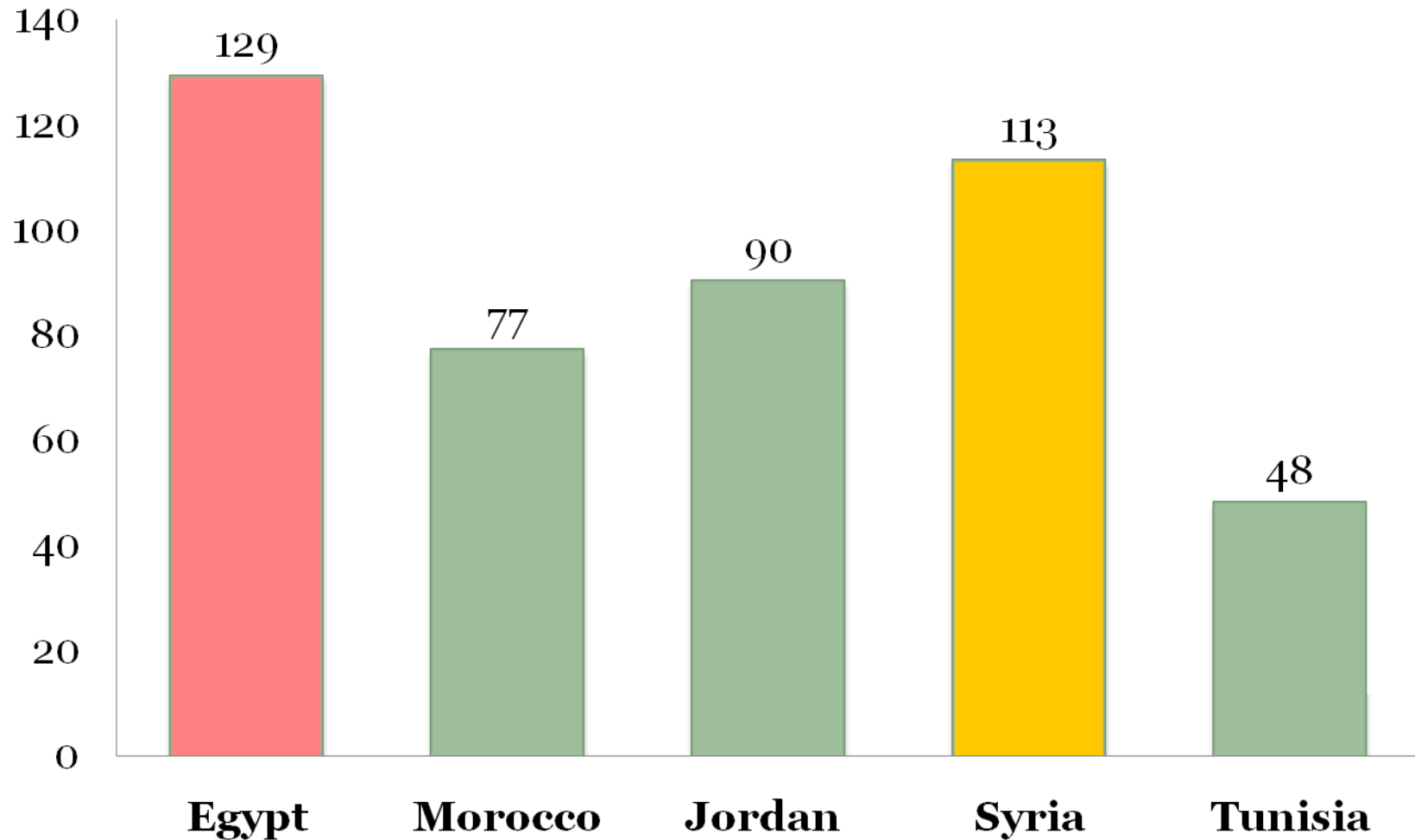
3. Providing an opportunity for outstanding Universities to occupy rightful place regionally
